

# **Swachh Bharat:**

- National Mission Phase I: 2014 – 2019 // Phase II: 2020-2025

- Aim: Achieve elimination of open defecation by 2019

- Budget: ₹230,000 crore (*AUD\$40.4 billion*) / ₹12,000 (AUD*\$210*) per toilet

- Phase 1  $\cong$  90 Million Toilets Built

Swachh Bharat Mission (Grameen (Rural)) Guidance: *Ministry of Drinking Water and Sanitation (now Jal Shakti)* 

Inc: privacy, menstruation, gender based violence

Swachh Bharat Mission (Urban) Guidance: Ministry of Housing & Urban Affairs

# **Transgender Persons Bill, 2016**

"(1) A transgender person shall have a right to be recognized as such, in accordance with the provisions of the Act"

# National WASH Conclave, 2022
