5. Address failure in the funding process

- Be clear about how you allocate funds
- Provide funding for co-design from the start
- Provide flexibility so grantees can respond to failures





- Demonstrate value of honest discussions
- What IS sustainability exactly?!

Top tips for sharing and learning

- 1. Power matters take time to build trust
- 2. Language matters think about what words to use
- 3. Sensitive conversations are easier in person
- 4. Provide incentives to share
- 5. Integrate learning within your working processes
